Subtraction

1. Understanding:

Tom has 32 apples. He gives away 8 apples to his friend. How many apples does he have left?

2. Fluency:

Calculate 45 - 7 using the column method. Show your working.

3. Reasoning:

If you have 50 sweets and you eat 23, how many sweets do you have now? Explain how you worked it out.

4. Problem-Solving:

Sarah has 64 stickers. After losing some, she counts only 29 left. How many stickers did she lose?

Subtraction

1. Understanding:

A box contains 78 marbles. If 29 marbles are taken out, how many marbles remain in the box?

2. Fluency:

Use the column method to solve: 152 - 48. Remember to show how you regroup.

3. Reasoning:

Jenny had 120 pages in her book. If she reads 37 pages, how many pages does she have left? Explain your steps clearly.

4. Problem-Solving:

A farmer has 135 eggs. He sells 67 of them at the market. How many eggs does he have left? Write out your working.

Subtraction

1. Understanding:

A library has 234 books. If 198 are borrowed and returned after a week, how many are left in the library?

2. Fluency:

Solve 472 - 259 using the column method, ensuring you show all your regrouping clearly.

3. Reasoning:

In a classroom, there are 150 pencils. If 82 pencils are broken and need to be thrown away, how many usable pencils are left? Explain your reasoning.

4. Problem-Solving:

A school has 405 marbles for games. If 128 marbles are used for a game and 57 are lost, how many marbles are remaining? Detail your calculation method.
